Pupil Premium Strategy 2017 to 2018

Pupil premium is allocated to schools in addition to main school funding, to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

With the introduction of the Universal Infant Free School Meal for Year R, 1 and 2, we have tried to encourage parents to apply where eligible for FSM and, therefore, qualify for the pupil premium.

We are offering additional benefits/incentives to encourage eligible families to apply, once eligibility is confirmed families will receive:

- FREE UNIFORM ON ENTRY TO RECEPTION SAVING £28.50
 (1 x sweatshirt, 1 x PE shorts, 1 x PE T-shirt, 1 x bookbag and 1 x cap)
- FREE UNIFORM EACH YEAR SAVING £17.50 each year (1 x sweatshirt, 1 x PE shorts, 1 x PE t-shirt)
- FREE SCHOOL TRIPS SAVING approx. £5 £18 per trip
- FREE AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS (teacher led only from Summer Term 2018)
- SUBSIDISED RESIDENTIAL TRIPS
- TRANSPORT COSTS FOR Y4 CURRICULUM SWIMMING LESSONS SAVING £30
- SMALL GROUP MUSIC LESSONS

The pupil premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM').

Schools also receive funding for children (CLA) who have been looked after (continuously for more than six months), children of service personnel, pupila who have left LA care, because of one of the following reasons: adoption, a special guardianship order a child arrangements order or a residence order.

- Children eligible for Pupil Premium were offered free places at after school clubs, free school trips, free milk and free logoed items of school uniform
- Children were offered 2 courses a year, at Davison's Youth University, paid for by the school
- Pupil Premium children were asked for a voluntary contribution towards the cost of school trips, and transport costs for curriculum swimming lessons and visitors in to school. However, if this could not be paid it was funded from PP money.
- The deposit was asked for towards the Year 5 Residential Trip.
- Enrichment and Sport opportunities, which included Pupil Premium children, ran throughout the year, such as, Voices for Freedom, Dance Time, Military Voices, visit from Julia Donaldson, Legacy games and sport competitions and events.

THE IMPACT OF PPG SPENDING 2016 to 2017

The school (SENDCO & Inclusion) evaluates the impact of interventions on each pupil termly and the overall effectiveness of each strategy annually. Evaluations focus on academic progress and pupil's attitudes to learning and well-being/readiness to learn.

Pupil progress meetings with HT/DHT and class teachers are held termly to identify needs. PP children are discussed at these meeting to evaluate progress and plan next steps in their learning.

MAIN BARRIERS TO EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT 2017 to 2018

- School in a significant area of deprivation (Central Ward) information from Community Profile
 2014
 - Central ward is the most deprived ward in Worthing/4th most deprived ward in West Sussex
 - Readiness for school by age 5 (2011/12) Central ward 54.1%, third lowest of Worthing wards
 - Central Ward saw the largest increase in the ethnic group 'White Other' from 2001 to 2011. A rise of over a 100%

- Pupil Premium children will be asked for a voluntary contribution towards the cost of school trips and transport costs for curriculum swimming lessons, and visitors in to school. However, if this cannot be paid it will be funded from PP money following a discussion with parents.
- Deposits will be expected towards residential trips in Year 5 and Year 6. A discussion regarding the remaining costs will take place with parents.
- Children will be offered 2 courses at Davison's Youth University paid for by the school
- Enrichment and Sports Opportunities will include Pupil Premium children, e.g. Voices for Freedom, Dance Time, sport competitions and events.
- School lunches provided for CLA.

APPROACHES TAKEN IN ORDER TO:

- Support EAL children to develop language skills and enable them to access the curriculum
- Narrow the gap between PP children and their peers
- Reduce the barriers to learning so children fully access the curriculum
- Raise basic literacy and numeracy standards to match those of their peers
- Support PP children to feel part of the school community
- Ensure PP children access enrichment and sporting opportunities in line with their peers
- Improve academic outcomes for vulnerable pupils
- Support children attending 'Calm Start' to begin the day in a more positive manner and, therefore, concentrate better in the classroom
- Train TA's to support children to interact in groups for learning
- Support speech and language development so it is not a barrier to learning and achievement
- Significantly improve behaviour for learning across the school
- Develop fine and gross motor skills and key skills for learning
- Address school readiness in Early Years Foundation Stage
- Improve children's individual writing skills
