<u>Key Vocabulary</u>	<u>Definition</u>
Seascape	A photograph, painting, or other work of art which depicts (shows) the sea.
Impressionism	Impressionism is a style of painting that focuses on the effects of light and atmosphere on colours and forms.
Romanticism	Romantic art focused on emotions, feelings, and moods of all kinds.
Realism	Is the accurate representation of nature or objects. Things are closely observed and then drawn and painted. Artwork can look like a photograph.
Gouache (gw-ash)	Is similar to watercolour and acrylic paint. It is a mixture of natural and manmade pigments.
Cool and warm colours	They can be used to show different emotions and feelings e.g. red- anger, happiness, blue - sadness, quiet.

Claude Monet - He was born in 1840 in Paris, France. He was inspired by the work of the landscape artist John Constable. He used a broken colour technique that is used to create the feeling/sensation of light. This is part of impressionism.

JMW Turner- He was born in London in 1775. His name was Joseph Mallord William. He always wanted to become an artist and at the age of 14 he became a student at the Royal academy of art in London. He loved to paint outdoors. He was a romantic landscape painter.

Winslow Homer- He was born in America in 1836. He was a landscape artist and printmaker. He used watercolours. His style of art was realism and impressionism.
